#### Recipe of the Month: Baked Potato Soup

4 lg. baking potatoes 6 c. milk 2/3 c. butter 1 c. sour cream

2/3 c. all-purpose flour
3/4 tsp. salt
1/4 c. thinly-sliced green onions
10 bacon strips, cooked & crumbled
1/4 tsp. white pepper
1 c. (4 oz.) shredded cheddar cheese

Bake potatoes at 350° for 65 to 75 minutes, or until tender; cool completely. Peel and cube potatoes. In large saucepan, melt butter. Stir in flour, salt and pepper until smooth. Gradually add milk. Bring to a boil; cook and stir for 2 minutes, or until thickened. Remove from heat; whisk in sour cream. Add potatoes and green onions. Garnish with bacon and cheese.

#### Attending Citizens Academy: Worth the wait

I heard about Citizens Academy in an odd way. It was the fall of 1999 when I was living in Sioux City and had a little extra time on my hands. I decided to volunteer and randomly settled on an alcoholic treatment center. I don't remember the name of the place or the name of the woman in charge that I met with, but while discussing ways I could help, she sidetracked and shared how much she enjoyed attending Citizens Academy with the Sioux City Police Department. I perked up. Learn more about how the law enforcement operates? A chance to ride along with officers? Shoot guns? I was intrigued. I returned home and called the police department. They added me to their waiting list. I never did volunteer with the alcoholic rehab place.

In the spring of 2000 I attended Citizens Academy in Sioux City. We toured the police station, sat with dispatchers, rode with an officer and met the K-9 unit. We learned CPR and defense tactics. We reenacted traffic stop scenarios. We drove the skid pan and obstacle course. We viewed crime scene slides (yes, with dead bodies). We observed two of our classmates downing drinks before trying to pass the sobriety test. We watched two of the biggest students attempt to handcuff a much smaller student (they couldn't). We voluntarily tased ourselves (using low voltage, of course). And we shot those guns.

We graduated after 12 weeks of Wednesday classes but I didn't want the class to end. So, when I moved back to Plymouth County, one of the first things I did was check to see if the local police department offered the class. It didn't.

However, that changed a few years ago. The class was offered -- but only to Le Mars residents. So close! I contacted the department. Yes, they were considering expanding the class offering to Plymouth County residents. I could wait a little longer.

In 2021 I was excited to learn the class would be offered to Plymouth County residents. However, I was cast in a play that was going live around the same time so I didn't apply. After all those years of waiting, what was another year?

Finally, in the fall of 2022 I attended Citizens Academy with the Le Mars Police Department and Plymouth County Sheriff's Office. Every Tuesday and Thursday evening for four weeks beginning in October I devoured the class. We toured the police station, jail and dispatch center. We watched the K-9s run obstacle courses and sniff out drugs. We learned about the use of force, Constitutional law and drug enforcement. We watched traffic stop videos and viewed crime scene slides. We observed volunteers trying to pass the sobriety test. Instead of tasing ourselves, we watched new officers getting tased (it's a requirement). And yes, we shot the guns.

Although many of the topics were the same in both classes, some things had changed over time, including the introduction of body cameras and increased need for school security. What didn't change? The chill from viewing the crime scene slides. Knowing I'm not cut out to be on the force. And having a blast.

Interested in taking the class? It's free, completely voluntary and offered every fall. I would suggest watching for application requests toward the end of summer or contacting the police department directly. After waiting 22 years to attend the class a second time, all I can say is, the class is worth the wait.
