Bill Goldmann shares US currency's historical significance

It was no surprise that the room at the Plymouth County Historical Museum reserved for the February 18 meeting of the Northwest Iowa Genealogical Society was full of attendees. The program following the meeting was highly anticipated. Brunsville's own Bill Goldmann was to share his knowledge of historical currency during a program titled "The Story of America as told through currency." And he did not disappoint.

Since the age of nine, Bill has collected historical currency. "Currency isn't just money; it holds a lot of history," he said. How true it is, as we learned from his presentation.

On hand was an abundant selection from Bill's U.S. currency collection. "Anything could be money," he said. The first currency made in America was wampum, small polished beads made from quahog clam shells. Wampum was used in New England for over thirty years. A lot of the silver and copper coins used during the same time were from Europe.

"The need to create currency was often a result of some type of disaster," Bill explained. And it was usually a war. One example he gave was the Revolutionary War, which began in 1775. The colonies printed their own currency to fund the war, which was a big deal because in 1764 the British Parliament passed the Currency Act in an attempt to gain control of colonial currency.

Referring to the printing of our currency, Bill asked the group, "How does this all affect us personally?"

"If currency hadn't been issued," he continued, "we'd be British."

Our stabilized monetary system was also a result of a disaster. The financial crisis of 1907 led to the formation of the Federal Reserve in 1913.

The backs of notes said they were redeemable in gold, a buffer against financial crisis. "But

we learned differently in 1929," Bill said. In a panic, people removed their money from their banks and very little currency remained. Thirty percent of banks closed including First National Bank of Le Mars. It was located inside the building that houses Pizza Ranch at the corner of Central Avenue and Plymouth Street.

Interestingly enough, local banks were able to issue currency, including banks in Le Mars. Bank employees would cut sheets of six bills into individual bills and some of the edges weren't cut straight. Bill held up a \$20 bill issued by First National Bank of Le Mars in 1934. The top edge was curvy.

The story behind Bill's \$5 silver certificate featuring the image of Chief Running Antelope of the Sioux Nation was quite fascinating. It was the only time a Native American image was used on our currency. Unfortunately, the image caused controversy because the chief was shown wearing a Pawnee headdress. His Sioux headdress was too tall to fit in the image.

Bill's collection included currency from King Philip's War in 1675 to Desert Storm in 1990. Among the many notable pieces were a fifteen-shilling note printed by Benjamin Franklin and a "widow's mite," which was similar to the coin given by the poor widow at the well that Jesus spoke of.
