Prairie Rose serves as first stop on Junior Golf tour

Prairie Rose Golf Course played host to the first stop of the season for the Northwest Iowa Junior Tour on June 13.

Landen Reuter of Le Mars had the low round of the day with a 43-36-79 to win the championship flight, which consisted of 19 players.

Isaac Postma of Rock Valley won the Boys 11-14-year old division, shooting 40-40-80 for 18 holes.

Kieran Cunningham of Le Mars was the winner in the Boys 11-12, carding 47 for nine holes. Carter Beitelspacher of Le Mars won a playoff with Brady Jochum of Le Mars after each shot 50 in the Boys 13-14 nine-hole division.

Grayson Schultz of Le Mars had the low score in the Boys Short Course Plus, shooting 36 over 1,335 yards (nine holes).

The Girls Short Course 10-year old winner was Callie Campbell of Storm Lake with 39 over 900 yards. Ady Edwards of Akron won the Girls 6-7-year old Short Course with 48 from 900 yards.

The Prairie Rose stop was the first of six tournament stops for the Junior Tour, which runs through August 1. Remsen, Le Mars, Cherokee, Akron and Orange City will also host events.

The events are conducted by Junior Golf of NW Iowa Inc., a 501(C) not-forprofit organization based in Le Mars. The Operation 36 Academy at Willow Creek is ranked No. 4 out of 600 worldwide. The three ahead of Le Mars are in Canada, California and Florida.

Under the guidance of Dan Gray and many generous volunteers, Le Mars Operation 36 includes 109 junior golfers.

Prairie Rose Golf Club hosts 28 teams on Great Plains Senior Tour

The Great Plains Senior Tour made a stop at Prairie Rose Golf Club in Brunsville last month.

A total of 28 teams competed in the event. The Great Plains Senior Tour is a men's traveling tour to area courses on a weekday schedule. It is a 2-man scramble format for men 50 years of age and older.

All placewinners in each of the 37 events held during the summer qualify for the GPS Tournament of Champions on Sept. 30 in Brookinas, South Dakota.

Ed Rolfes and Lyle Ver Steeg shot an 8-under-par 64 to win the first flight. They were one shot better than Dan Gray and Randy Kroese, as well as Dave Aalbers and Glenn Baker. Dan Minton and Greg Thone placed fourth.

The second-flight winners were Lance Kramer and Ron DeKok, who shot 71. Dave Huber and Rich Hofer were second with 71, while Dean Bullerman and Ray Hoogeveen also shot 71 for third place. Fourth place went to John Poleis and Rick Dorzak with 72.

Robert Meendering and Warren Boogaard won the third flight with 75. Second place went to Tommy Koopmans and Weiner Vande Vegte with 76, while DeLee Knutson and Tom Jones also shot 76 for third place. Mike Larson and Clyde Sorensen claimed fourth place with 77.

This was the third year that Prairie Rose has hosted a Great Plains Senior Tour event.

Recipe of the month: Ice cream roll

3 eggs	1 c. sugar
1/4 tsp. cream of tarter	1 tsp. vanilla
Sift together: 3/4 c. flour	1/4 c. cocoa
1 tsp. baking powder	Powdered sugar
5 T. hot water	Ice cream

Preheat oven to 350°. Beat the eggs, cream of tarter, sugar and vanilla really well, then gradually add the flour-cocoa mixture. Mix well. Add the baking powder and hot water. Use a jellyroll pan lined with waxed paper. Pour the batter into the pan. Bake 15 minutes. When done, flip onto a dish towel that is sprinkled with powdered sugar. When cooled really well, put scoops of ice cream onto the roll. Even out the ice cream and roll up. Wrap with the dish towel, cover with tinfoil and put into the freezer.

Note: Vanilla or any kind of ice cream works. This lasts well in the freezer.

Speaking of salt

• The average person consumes about six to 15 grams of salt daily, which amounts to about 2 teaspoons. The body requires only 500 milligrams, or half a gram, daily unless you are perspiring heavily. The American Heart Association recommends no more than 2.4 grams, or 2,400 milligrams.

• Canned peas have 100 times the sodium of raw peas.

• If you're on a reduced-sodium diet, you probably already rely on herbs and spices to perk up flavors — but beware of commercially prepared seasoning blends. Many are loaded with sodium. You're better off reading the ingredient lists and concocting your own, with less or no — added salt.
